Introduction:

These cards are designed to be used for a fun logical deduction game that your students can play to practice using body-part vocabulary in sentence form.

This game is set up to be played in pairs. Two teachers can play together to demonstrate the game, a teacher can play with a student, or two students can play together. To allow for multiple games to occur in the classroom simultaneously, print and prepare multiple copies of these materials.

Instructions:

To play this game, Partner A lays out one set of 18 cards in front of her, on a table, on the floor, or on some other surface. Partner B randomly chooses one card from the second identical set of 18 cards (without showing it to Partner A) and keeps it a secret.

Partner A must now deduce which one of the 18 cards in front of her matches the "secret card" in Partner B's possession by asking questions.

Based on Partner B's answers, after asking each question, Partner A flips over any cards that cannot logically be the "secret card" that Partner B is holding.

The game continues until Partner A has flipped over 17 of the cards in front of her and only one card still remains.

Question Examples:

1. Does the monster have a blue body or a purple body?

- 2. How many heads does the monster have?
- 3. Does the monster have a green hand?
- 4. Does the monster have two green hands?

5. How many fingers does the monster's green hand have?

- 6. Does the monster have a tail?
- 7. How many mouths does the monster have?
- 8. Does the monster have toes?
- 9. What colors are the monster's feet?
- 10. Does the monster have a shoe?

Quick Tip


Sometimes, the difference between two cards will require a single specific vocabulary word to describe. For example, the difference between the two cards below is that one monster has toes & the other monster does not.



Assembly: Print and cut out all components according to the instructions provided on each page. For long-lasting durability, print the cards onto cardstock or use regular paper and then laminate.


